



Distribution See back cover This entertaining adventure about a giraffe-obsessed boy offers a tender fable of a father's love triumphing over adversity. Loosely based on a real-life story, it is also a subtle reflection on the absurdities of life under occupation.

In many ways, Ziad is a lucky boy: his dad, Yacine, is a vet at the zoo and Ziad spends as much time as he wants with the zoo's giraffes, his favourite animals. But Ziad lives in the West Bank... When the male giraffe dies during an Israeli air raid, the traumatised female, Rita, stops feeding. Alarmed by his son's despair, Yacine promises to find Rita a mate. But in a Palestinian zoo so strapped for cash that bears are fed carrots and a donkey with painted stripes has to stand in for a zebra, fulfilling such a promise might well take a miracle.



In 2010, twenty years after Estonia had re-established its independence from the Soviet Union, a series of party funding scandals threatened the stability of this new republic. To expose political hypocrisy and manipulation, a young theatre group took on their boldest, most ambitious project to date: the creation of a new political party. But was it a hoax, or were they for real?

Ash & Money documents performance art at its most powerful: a pertinent, thought-provoking and truly participative exploration of social issues that exposes the weaknesses of democracy while pointing to the power of civil society.



Brad Pitt exec produces Boynton's extraordinary exposé of the hope, ambition, scepticism and corruption that threaten to exacerbate Africa's resource curse and leave its ordinary citizens behind.

In Ghana, a small American energy company fights to hold onto its discovery of oil just as a new government comes into power. Meanwhile, in Nigeria, an established industry continues to take its toll from the people, most notably in the Niger Delta. In 2014, landmark legislation in Scotland legalised same-sex marriage: only the seventeenth country to do so out of more than two hundred. Reflecting this cause across the Atlantic, Case Against 8 charts the deeply moving stories of two gay couples in their quest to take on a system stacked against them.

In 2008, Californians passed Proposition 8, a measure that repealed the right of same-sex couples to marry. In its wake, two of American politics' heavyweight legal foes — Bush and Gore's respective councils Ted Olson and David Boies — unite their different ideologies to the same end: to overturn the amendment.

Filmed over several years, *E-Team* follows four ordinary individuals with extraordinary responsibilities, in their efforts to document and report on human rights violations committed in several war zones. It succeeds, with vivid immediacy, in conveying the urgency, the danger and the complexity that underpin their work – and also the daily difficulties of balancing a family life with such emotionally gruelling activities.

This is a powerful insight into one of the mightiest weapons against the abuse of power: the battle to bring perpetrators to the full glare of international attention and, hopefully, to justice.

From London, Ukraine and Syria, to the US, Iran and Spain... hailing the revolutionary spirit of clowns, music, ping pong and the human body, Everyday Rebellion is a moving and playful celebration of the triumph of creativity over repression, and a vibrant reminder that power must always give way to humanity.

Guided by evidence that boldly asserts non-violence is twice as effective as violence in creating change, millions of people are dropping their fists and adopting peaceful tactics to resist blind power – from boardrooms to market squares. 




