


Scottish Government Invests £2.2M on Electric Vehicle Infrastructure



Edinburgh Council are install to 66 additional on-street charging points 32 (including fast 9 chargers, rapid chargers, and 24 slow chargers) in order to strengthen the city's existing electric

vehicle infrastructure. The Council's business case has been approved and a project plan has detailed key tasks. These include determining the best procurement route, recruiting resources, continuing ongoing discussions with the energy network operator on grid issues, progressing Transport Regulation Orders and liaising with contractors. Installation will run from January 2020 to December 2020.

The Council aim to ensure charging equipment is located on roads and near, but not adjacent to, residential properties, rather than on pavements to reduce street clutter and allow residents to park outside their homes.

An enforcement policy is under development, to ensure electric vehicle bays, which will operate 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, are not used for unlimited parking and are reserved for electric vehicles.

Gordon commented, "With this project, Edinburgh will become a leading example in the drive to decarbonise transport. I am pleased to see that the Scottish Government are supporting this initiative through a £2.2 million grant via the Switched on Towns and Cities Fund."

"This is only the roll-out of the first phase. The plan is to eventually see 211 on-street charging points by 2023 at a cost of £3.3m. This will help clear the air in the city from diesel and petrol fumes — it is also forecast to make carbon savings of 7,715 tonnes and savings in nitrogen dioxide of over 14 tonnes."

Colinton Tunnel Mural



On a visit to see ongoing works at the Colinton Tunnel Mural, Gordon met with Mike Scott, the project chairman, and Chris Rutterford, the mural artist.

The finished mural is set to be the biggest in Scotland, if not the UK.

Gordon commented, "The mural is truly stunning in its scale and ambition.

"This project is turning a dark and unwelcoming tunnel into a bright and vibrant work of art celebrating the industrial, social, artistic, and literary history of our community."

The project cost is over £100,000 and more donations are required to help fund the artists' costs, school and community workshops, paint and materials.
